Hull Hebrew Congregation Trustee's Report

The Trustees present their Report and the Accounts of the Congregation for the year ended 31st December, 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective January

1. Trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees' are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial
- prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to provide for the advancement of the Jewish Religion.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

2. Legal and administrative details

The Charity (Reg. No. 1035451) operates by the guidelines of its constitution adopted in 1994 as amended in 2006, together with the new Charity name of Hull Hebrew Congregation.

The Charity is run by a Council consisting of 16 elected Trustees.

Finances of the Charity are administered by the Hon. Treasurer who reports to the Council regularly giving a full description of the Charity's financial position.

The Hull Hebrew Congregation was constituted in 1994 with the amalgamation of the Hull Old Hebrew Congregation, Hull Western Synagogue and the Hull Judeans Maccabi Association and has operated in accordance with its stated objects of the advancement of the Jewish Religion in Hull and the surrounding area, to provide for youth in its area and to advance the education of the public in particular with regard to Judaism and the Jewish Faith and Hebrew Language.

When planning our activities for the year the trustees have considered the Commission's guidance on public benefit, and in particular the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

4. Review of the year

A summary of the financial activities for the year ended 31st December, 2015 provided in further detail with comparative results on page 6 is as follows:

The total income of £87,351 was generated from: donations and gifts £8,837; contributions from members £43,601; investment income £113; other income £4,800 and legacies of £30,000.

Charitable expenditure amounting to £121,906 comprised of provision of charitable services £119,153 and fundraising and publicity £2,753.

Of the deficit of £34,555 the transfer to accumulated fund amounted to £65,970 and a surplus of £31,415 to restricted reserves.

Howard Levy and Max Gold were elected Co-Presidents at the AGM on 5th June 2016.

We continue to be a very busy and pro-active congregation with the Rabbi and his wonderful family leading the way.

We have at times struggled with minyanim but on the whole we continue to succeed on Monday and Thursday evenings, Friday nights and of course Shabbat mornings and Sunday mornings. In addition we are able to have minyanim for Yartzheits on various days.

The Rabbi has continued with his shuirim on a Saturday evening which are proving popular.

During the year we continue to have cholent lunches, the regular Friday night chicken soup and the Sunday morning breakfasts.

Lag B'Omer was celebrated with an excellent barbeque and at Chanukah we repeated the hugely successful fish and chip lunch which seems to be one of the highlights of the year.

This year for Shabbat UK we changed the format. People were invited to members' homes to experience Friday night and then a communal lunch was organised following the Shabbat morning service. It was all well attended and thanks go to all who provided the meals and all who took part. The Yomim Noraim this year were conducted by Rabbi Lifschitz and Simon Caplan. Simon came with his wife and boys and they always feel like part of the community.

Our gentlemen assisted and supported as always and the Yom Tov days passed with great dignity and enjoyment for those who attended. The Mitzvah of Chosan Torah and Chosan Bereshit this year was given to Max and Les Gold. It was a successful evening and was enjoyed immensely by all those who attended

At the AGM Avril Sugarman and Anna Grantham were re- elected joint chairmen of the Ladies Guild. They have provided Shabbat Kiddushim throughout the year, events at Chanukah and Purim and all the other events at our Communal Centre. Their excellent catering is an important part of our community's social life and we are sure that everyone joins us in expressing our thanks to them and all the ladies that help.

It is with great pride that we continue to support our ex-service men and women, ably led by Perris Coupland together with Cyril Brown, in welcoming civic and parliamentary dignitaries to our Shul to honour the communitys fallen of the two great wars. This year Rabbi Lifschitz led the service and his address was appreciated by all who attended.

We express our sincere thanks to all those gentlemen who have assisted in conducting services during the course of the year. In particular, the wardens, Ian Dysch, Max Gold, Howard Levy and Jonathan Levine. We are also indebted to Max Gold, Conrad Segelman, Scott Bahari and others for leading services and performing Haftarah.

lan Dysch was elected Chairman of the Chevra Kadisha and is very ably assisted by Philip Daniels. The work in this area goes on with great efficiency and sensitivity. Our discreet words of appreciation and thanks to all the team that continue to give service, especially with respect to Tahara, seem hardly adequate.

The year was recognised as the 250th anniversary of the first permanent Jewish residents in Hull. Huge congratulations must go to David Lewis who instituted a year of presentations and lectures to celebrate the 250 years of unbroken Jewish presence in the city. Included was a successful event at the History Centre, where visitors came from all over to enjoy the lecturers.

As part of the celebrations a commemorative service was held at our synagogue with around 200 people attending, including many dignitaries and former members who came from all over. It was a very successful and memorable occasion. Congratulations must go to the Representative Council who organised the event in conjunction with Rabbi Lifschitz.

During the year we had, for the first time, a visit from the professional Jewish comedian Ashley Blaker, who gave a very entertaining performance to a large and appreciative audience. It was another successful first for our community.

Secular organisations and very many schools continue to visit our Shul, the latter in conjunction with the national curriculum religious education syllabus. We are most grateful to Sharon Dysch, Avril Sugarman and Anna Grantham for all the hard work they do in this regard, and also for visiting schools in the wider area. Can we also thank Michael Westerman for the Jewish teaching he does in the wider community.

Thanks must go to all the members of the Executive for all their hard work and assistance, and to the Council for their support and advice. In addition we thank Philip Daniels for all his advice and work as Chairman of the Custodial Trustees.

A huge thank you goes to the Rabbi and his family for enhancing our community. Although we are small in number his improvements have brought out the best in all of us. We do not know of any other community where the welcome is as warm and hospitable as ours.

During the year Debbie and Jonathan Levine sadly left our community to start a new life in Radlett. We thank them both heartily for all their invaluable and hard work for our community for which we will always owe a debt of gratitude. We will miss them but wish nothing but success, good health and happiness for them and all their family.

From the AGM in June, a veritable tsunami of challenges, problems and opportunities were forthcoming, involving the cemeteries, security, 250th anniversary celebrations and other issues. However, with the support of the Rabbi, Rebbetzin, Executive and Council and our wonderful congregation, we know we will continue to be successful.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Hull Hebrew Congregation

I report on the accounts of the Trust for the year ended 31st December, 2015 which are set out on pages 7 to 13.

1. Accounting policies

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

b) Voluntary income

Cash donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the income and expenditure account as they are received. Significant non cash donations are included in the income and expenditure account at the Council's estimate of their market value when received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

c) Other operating income

All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

d) Investment income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on receipt. Dividends are included in the income and expenditure account when they are received, at an amount which includes the tax credit recoverable from the Inland Revenue.

e) Depreciation

Depreciation on assets is calculated on the straight line method and aims to write down the cost or valuation of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives.

The rates generally applicable are:

Freehold properties 1.25% Motor vehicles 25% Fixtures and fittings 5%

f) Designated funds

Designated funds are authorised by the Council to be set aside from unrestricted funds for future expenditure commitments.

g) Expenditure

This is accounted for on an accruals basis. Where expenditure is incurred which relates to more than one cost category, the expenditure is apportioned over all relevant headings.

i) Administration

Administration includes the cost of management of the Charity's affairs.

ii) Fundraising

Fundraising includes the costs of raising the Charity's gifted income.

iii) Publicity

Publicity includes the cost of raising public awareness to the Charity's objectives.

h) Legacies and donations

Legacies and donated income are accounted for upon notification to the Council.

2. Taxation

The association is a U.K. registered charity, number 1035451. All the association's income is applied to its charitable objectives and the association is, therefore, exempt under current legislation from most forms of taxation.
