The Synagogue has had a successful year. Membership has increased to 520 largely as a result of a series of pastoral visits which the Rev. S. Venitt and the Rev. B. Paletz had the zeal to make, while Mr. M. Sharpe has taken care to see that income has increased in proportion. Men, women and money are three of the essentials if the work of the Synagogue is to go forward, so we must be grateful to those who have striven to secure them.

Rev. Venitt has also founded another section of the Western Area Jewish Centre in the shape of a club for juniors of the age-group 13 to 17. It is to be hoped that this will provide a "nursery" which the Synagogue can look to for its future workers and worshippers. Further indications of Rev. Venitt's success with the young is to be found in the roll of children attending the Hebrew and Religion Classes, which he has been able to step up to 70. The good quality of the teaching is attested by the favourable report made by the visiting inspector from the L.B.J.E. In this work, Rev. Venitt has had the who'e-hearted and energetic support of Dr. L. Freeman, the Chairman of the Classes Committee.

Everybody, and particularly the Honorary Officers, will lament the death of Mr. R. Winston, who was Financial Representative when the last report was issued. He was indeed a most lovable person, who combined in a singular degree the qualities of amiability and efficiency. Beneath his quiet and self-effacing manner there lay a devotion to communal duty which without doubt over-taxed his strength, but he never spared himself. The congregation offers its deepest sympathy to Mrs. Winston and the bereaved family.

A memorable and edifying event in the history of the Synagogue was the gathering which met on 27th April, 1947, to mark the 27th year of the Rev. B. Paletz's ministry. It was the desire of the congregation to show their esteem and gratitude by presenting him with a cheque, but the Rev. Paletz wished that the sum of money collected by the congregation amounting to over £300 should go, not to him, but to endow a bed at the Norwood Jewish Orphanage. This remarkable act of self-denial cannot but serve as an inspiring example. The gathering was attended by over 250 people, including Dayan H. M. Lazarus, Deputy for the Chief Rabbi. The Rev. Paletz was presented with an illuminated address expressive of the sentiments of the congregation, and he in turn presented the Synagogue with a Kiddush Cup.

The congregation will be glad to learn that the Rev. Paletz, who was due for retirement, has complied with the wish of the congregation and has consented to serve for another year.

During the winter months worshippers had to rely for warmth on the spiritual fire within. This was due to the heating system having become worn out. The pertinacity of Mr. P. Wender at length succeeded in moving the Building Committee of the United Synagogue to do the necessary repairs, upon which a sum of over £400 was voted, and the congregation may look forward to a tolerably warmed building next autumn. There have been a number of benefactors to whom the congregation would like to express their thanks. On Shevuoth Mr. F. J. Hawkings provided floral decorations; at Simchas Torah, Messrs. Coleman and Benzimra were respectively Chasan Torah and Chasan Berishith, and entertained the congregation most generously, thereby adding another to their long list of generosities; on the High Holydays, Mr. G. Belcher acted as Segan and Mr. S. Topper as Beadle at the overflow service in the Communal Hall, stray visitors, such as Wardens, to these services are always impressed by the atmosphere of undemonstrative piety, which must be partly due to the example of these gentlemen and to the manner in which Mr. W. E. Levy and Mr. I. Pepper read the service.

Mr. H. Schneiderman provided refreshments to the Children's Chanucah treat, which was much appreciated, while the catering for Chanucah and Purim was done by the Ladies' Guild, who are always to be seen busily helping wherever such help is required.

Much needed gifts of Siddurim were received from the Ladies' Guild, Mr. and Mrs. H. Caplan, Messrs, L. Greenbaum, D. Tesler, S. Kadish, A Stanley and H. Mandelson,

Mr. H. Caplan has very kindly had the ornaments of the Scrol's polished and burnished. This is a work which will give everybody pleasure, and we hope Mr. Caplan will see the gratitude of the congregation reflected in these shining surfaces.

To all these ladies and gentlemen, the Honorary Officers, on behalf of the congregation offer their hearty thanks. YAHRZEITS

HAMMERSMITH SYNAGOGUE HEBREW & RELIGION CLASSES

The religious nurturing of our youngsters is so vital a problem that the Committee of the Hammersmith Synagogue Religion Classes now under the Chairmanship of Dr. L. Freeman, has held recetings at frequent intervals during the last year in order to focus its attention on and to discuss every possible angle of the subject whereby our classes may be improved in their cultural standards and numerical strength. Closer co-operation with the Ladies' Guild has been effected by the co-opting on the Committee of Mrs. L. Fox to represent them.

Under the supervision of the Rev. Venitt as Headmaster, assisted by an enthusiastic staff in Mrs. Venitt, Miss Belcher and Mr. Lipschitz, the groups in the Classes have expanded, the total roll now mustering over 70 children.

The Religion Classes function at the Communal Hall at the following times:—

Sunday: 10.15 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. Tuesday: 5.15 p.m. to 6.45 p.m. Thursday: 5.15 p.m. to 6.45 p.m.

Despite the difficulties of geographical distribution, there is a good attendance on Sundays. With the advent of summery conditions, a marked improvement is anticipated during the week. Tea is provided (through the unfailing kindness and care of the Ladies' Guild) on these weekday sessions. The whole problem of mid-week attendance is engaging the earnest attention of the Committee.

The Classes were honoured by the visit on the 15th February, 1948, of Dr. E. Kurzweil, who came as inspector of the London Board of Religious Education. The children rose to the occasion and much impressed our distinguished visitor by their insight into and knowledge of the intricacies of the "Siddur," "Chumash," Hebrew Reading and Grammar, Jewish Calendar and Religious Observances.

The homely atmosphere of the Classes, the enthusiasm of the staff, and the eagerness of the children were commented on by Dr. Kurzweil, who has sent a most encouraging and congratulatory report.

An outstandingly successful function at Chanucah took place on Sunday, 7th December, 1947. The traditional service in the Synagogue (conducted by the Rev. Paletz) was followed by the children's contribution in the Communal Hall, where there was a crowded gathering of proud parents and other members of the congregation. They witnessed the juvenile kindling of the Chanucah Lights (performed by Master Yudkin), followed by a series of traditional Chanucah sketches (directed by the Rev. Venitt and Miss Belcher), which brought back many nostalgic memories of happier times. A fine response was made to the appeal made by the Rev. Venitt for generous donors of school desks to enhance the existing Classes' equipment; as a result, 36 desks have now been added to our equipment. The service was followed by a "Kiddush" in the Communal Hall.

The Annual Prize Distribution took place at the Communal Hall on Sunday, 28th March, 1948, under the Chairmanship of Mr. A. Sheinfield. There was an enthusiastic gathering of young and old to watch the proud recipients of prizes, distributed by Mrs. Freeman. Dr. L. Freeman gave an address which outlined the aims of the Religion Classes, and asked for communal encouragement and support. An intriguing Purim play, "Casting of Lots," followed, competently played by a juvenile cast culled from our Classes (under the splendid direction of Miss Belcher).

Tea for all and a Fancy Dress competition (with much originality of design and thought) concluded the proceedings.

FOR THE CHILDREN

My dear Boys and Girls.

Six months have gone by since our last chat, but now, with another issue of the Magazine, we can renew our acquaintance. The last time I wrote was on the Eve of our New Year. Now we are about to celebrate Pesach, a festival which stands out as a landmark in our history. You know, an alternative name for it is "The Season of Our Freedom." because it was then that our ancestors went out of Egypt as Freemen. after many years of slavery. Now this aspect of the festival is one that may cause us to stop and think. In these days when we read almost daily of the sufferings of our fellow-Jews in other countries, we may wonder whether such freedom still exists. Many Jewish people hold the view that not until we have our own country and are recognised by the nations of the world as a real nation, can we consider ourselves truly free. In the light of this, you can see why the struggle over Palestine has become so important. What do you think and feel about this? In days gone by, when I was a boy, Pesach was a festival which we looked forward to with great excitement. First of all, there were all the preparations in the home to ensure that not a trace of Chametz or Leaven would be found, and then, best of all, there was the eagerly awaited Seder. The atmosphere at the Seder Table, when all the best cutlery and crockery and linen were used, can never be forgotten, and what of the lovely foods, the special dishes which mother spends hours in preparing. And then the Hagadah, with its interesting stories and rousing songs. Truly no other night in the year can compare to the Seder Night. I wonder how you celebrate the Seder. I think that would make a good subject for a competition. A prize will be given for the best description of a Seder-telling of the preparations, everything that is on the table, something about the service and its meaning, and, of course, all about the special foods. I hope there will be lots of entrants and perhaps I will be able to persuade the editor to publish the best effort in the next issue of this Magazine. I wish you all a very happy Yomtov, and hope to hear from many of you very soon,

B'NEI AKIVAH

In October of last year, with the Rev. and Mrs. Venitt's kind help, an Oneg Shabbat was held for the children of the Community. From this has developed the B'nei Akivah Group, holding a weekly Oneg Shabbat and meeting at least one Sunday per month in addition. There are now sixteen boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 13 who have passed their entrance test. All further tests are graded so that a thorough knowledge of basic Jewish religion, history and Palestinography, together with scouting ability, is obtained. During the summer months we hope to go on rambles with other groups, have sports events, etc.

The principle aim of the Oneg Shabbat is to teach the Chaverim by observation and practical participation the meaning and joy of a real Shabbat. A Sedrah report and news report, together with Hebrew songs, stories and grace over the Seudah Shilishit, are taken over by the Chaverim each week. So pleased are the H.Q. with the progress of the group that we are to present a Purim play at the B'nei Akivah function on the 30th March at Woburn House.

May I take this opportunity of appealing to all parents living in this district to send their children every Shabbat at 3.30 p.m.? Then may the group progress Mehayil el Havil.

HAMMERSMITH SYNAGOGUE - LADIES' GUILD

During the past year, the Ladies' Guild has made much progress. An outstanding social and financial success was the dance in aid of the Central British Fund. Many parcels of clothing have been forwarded to the Central British Fund for distribution on the Continent.

Our ladies have knitted an assortment of baby-clothes for the children born in the camps; some of these knitted clothes were sent to the babies from the Exodus ships. We sew for the London Jewish Hospital, and have repaired mantles and curtains for the Synagogue.

Our Fiag Day for Queen Charlotte's was a record, and the highest collection from any group in the district.

Appeals answered by us include Youth Aliyah, Jewish Blind Society, Home for Incurables, Home of Rest, U.J.R.A., Polish Jewry, Bachad and local relief to deserving cases.

The children of the Religion Classes were provided with a very fine tea on Chanucah and Purim.

HAMMERSMITH & WEST KENSINGTON SYNAGOGUE COMBINED CHARITIES FUND

If we can be sure of anything at all in a changing and uncertain world, it is that there is a continuing and urgent need of charity. It is in order to deal efficiently with this obligation that the Combined Charities Fund was inaugurated over a year ago. It mainly benefits those institutions which may be termed "hardy annuals"-the type of institute exemplified in the appended list of organizations to which donations have already been sent. It is not meant to supplant appeals of very great immediate importance, but, we pray, of a less permanent nature, arising from the plight of our kinsmen in Central Europe and the efforts to rehabilitate them in Palestine; nor does it supplant the separate appeals made by a few old-established institutes which have chosen to remain outside the scope of this Fund, such as the Norwood Orphanage and the Jewish Board of Guardians. There is, nevertheless, no reason why support to all these should not be given by the Fund at the discretion of its Committee.

During the year of its existence, a total of just under £400 was donated by some 110 members. For the present year we confidently anticipate a generous response from every single member of the Synagogue. No one can stand aside from such vital communal endeayour with an easy conscience.

In March of last year, Hammersmith Young Israel Society became The Riverpark Jewish Youth Club. It was hoped that a change in name would bring forth a change in heart and that the existing apathy would be brushed away. These expectations were fulfilled, and since then progress in almost every aspect of the Club's activities is reported.

As a result of a very enthusiastic publicity campaign, the membership of the Club was increased from about twenty-five active members to our present figure in the region of one hundred. This increased membership has given rise to many problems, the most serious at the moment being the limited time at our disposal. Our other main problem is Money. One very generous donation has been received from the Western Area Jewish Centre, and it served to provide us with much-needed equipment. However, we are still very short of the many amenities and comforts which turn an empty hall into a friendly and congenial club-room. We can but appeal to the senior members of the congregation for their active support in this matter.

We have come a long way this past year. In cricket, football, tabletennis, athletics and other such-like sports we have more than held our own with other youth clubs. Our literary functions, to which many well-known and distinguished persons have contributed, have been surprisingly well attended, and have been moreover of great value and enjoyment to all. It has been a point of great satisfaction to note that we have held our members without resorting to a series of dances, and this does prove without doubt that the youth of today is prepared to take a more serious outlook on life than they are usually given credit for. However, the two dances that we held—one in November and the other on New Year's Eve—were of great social value, and many creditable comments were passed on the high standard that was set.

It will be realised, therefore, that we are being successful in our object of making for the youth of this Community a Club of which they and their parents can be justifiably proud. The confidence in the

tion of a single type? The characteristics of a whole profession, race or religion seem suddenly to take shape and become embodied in one person. To experience such a phenomenon is, of course, a form of hallucination, for one is attributing to an individual the complex ideas formulated about a number of people over a period of time.

Thus it was that, after seeing it for the first time many years ago in The National Gallery, I used to think of Rembrandt's portrait of "A Jewish Rabbi" as symbolising the ascetic, contemplative and mystical qualities of many of our famous teachers and sages. But it was not until a few years ago that I encountered what was to me the complete epitome of the Jew—the Jew of all ages and of all countries.

The circumstances were unusual and undoubtedly accounted for the deep effect caused by that brief meeting. I had just been to visit in the Jewish quarter of the Mousky, the bazaar district of Cairo, the study in which Maimonides had lived and written, among other things, his "Guide to the Perplexed," some 750 years earlier. Over this historic building has been erected a modern synagogue, in the courty yard of which sat a large number of beggars. Their presence was clearly discouraged by the synagogue authorities, for within the building itself I had found an alms-box, over which was a notice asking visitors to put their donations there and to refrain from giving money to persons outside.

The sight of so much misery and poverty affected me deeply and, sad at heart, I was threading my way back through the narrow, dusty, noisy streets, when suddenly there appeared coming towards me a tall, majestic figure with head erect. It was evident that he was not a man of means, but his high forehead, long, consitive features, flowing beard and, above all, the gentle look in his eyes personified for me at that moment strength, dignity, wisdom and consciousness of purpose in a world of suffering.

Perhaps it was fitting that this personage, about whom I knew nothing but who left such a remarkable impression upon me, was walking the streets of the Cairo ghetto, where Karaites, Lamaritans and fugitives from Damascus, Constantinople, Salonika and Spain have sought refuge these many centuries past.

THE KETHUBAH IN ENGLISH LAW

People who are interested in Anglo-Jewish history might like to have a note on what is probably the first occasion on which the common law of England judicially recognised the Kethubah. In 1807 there was a lawsuit entitled Horn v. Noel; it was an action on a bill of exchange, and one Amelia Noel was being sued as the acceptor. Her defence was that she was a married woman and, as the law then stood (it was before the Married Women's Property Acts), not liable. Amelia Noel, however, was a Jewess (the name had been down-graded from Noah) and produced two witnesses who swore (to quote the words of the contemporary report) "that they were present in the Jewish Synagogue in Leadenhall Street in 1781 when the defendant was married by the High Priest to Henry Noah . . ." But it was held that this evidence was insufficient, and that what took place in the Synagogue was merely a ratification of some previous contract. The prudent Amelia thereupon produced her Kethubah and, to continue the words of the report, "the contract in the Hebrew tongue was accordingly but in and translated by an interpreter." This was held sufficient, and thus for the first time in English Law the Kethubah was held to be valid evidence of a Jewish marriage.

Moral: Ladies, take care of your Kethubah. (N.B.—There is a good picture of the Leadenhall Street Synagogue in Hyamson's book, "History of the Jews" in England).

It is possible that "Get" is mentioned in an earlier case.

In Ganer v. Lady Lanesborough, a case decided in 1790, one John King had to prove that he had been divorced. His former wife produced an "instrument under the seal of the Synagogue" at Leghorn to whereby the couple were said to be divorced. This document, however, was not admitted on the ground that judicial recognition could not, in the absence of further evidence, be accorded to the laws obtaining in Leghorn. It was, however, held that a Jewess might give parol evidence of her own divorce. But people are much more interesting than laws, and for my part I should like to know who this John King was, and why he had that disarming non-Jewish name, and yet was Jewish enough to marry a Jewish wife in one Synagogue and take the trouble to go all the way to Leghorn to get divorced in another. John King indeed! There is not a single Jew of the name King in the Jewish Encyclopædia.
