## Hammersmith & West Kensington Synagogue

## ANNUAL REPORT

The past year which has been one of steady progress in the history of the Synagogue, marked the 70th Anniversary of its foundation. By a happy coincidence this was "celebrated" by the complete redecoration of the interior of the building and we are happy to record that many expressions of delight at its present appearance have been made by visitors from other congregations.

Hebrew and Religion Classes. The total roll of the Western Area Regional Classes, including the two beginners' classes at Putney and Rochampton, now numbers 178, and in addition to the two joint Superintendents, a staff of seven teachers is employed.

Popular Lectures. A most successful series of Autumn lectures was given by Rabbi Dr. L. Jacobs, B.A., Ph.D., under the auspices of London University and Jews' College. An exceptionally high level of attendance was maintained throughout the Course. As usual, a series of special lectures by different speakers was held during May on "The Jewish Liturgy."

Adult Classes. In common with other Synagogues of the United Synagogue, congregants and other residents in the area were invited to attend special courses to learn or "brush-up" their Hebrew knowledge. These were supplemented by a course on the Hows and Whys of Judaism. The lecturers were the Rev. S. Venitt. and Rev. I. Abrams, assisted at times by Mrs. L. Freeman and Mrs. S. Venitt. Rev. Venitt is still continuing with one group, which has progressed from Aleph-Beth to Reading and Translation of Prayers. He would welcome enquiries from would-be pupils. The class meets on Thursdays at 8.0 p.m. It is hoped to start another beginners' class, if sufficient interest is forthcoming.

Communal Library. There has been a steady trickle of borrowers during the past year, and a number of new books, mostly best-sellers have been added to the list. Any would-be borrowers or donors of books can enquire of Rev. S. Venitt (RIV 7601) or of the Honorary Librarian, Miss R. Longhorn (RIV 8577).

Children's Services were successfully held on Sabbaths and Festivals throughout the year, conducted by Mrs. S. Venitt, assisted on the High Festivals by Miss Pamela Venitt.

Chanukah Service. As in previous years the complete service was rendered by boys from the Classes, and the children themselves provided the Choir. We are indebted to Rev. S. Forscher for their training.

Simchat Torah. We were happy to honour Mr. J. Mitchell and Mr. H. Gelpsman as Chasan Torah and Chasan Bereshith respectively. They and their ladies welcomed members at a most enjoyable reception on Sunday, 16th October.

Succah. The decoration and provision for the Succah was made possible this year not only by gifts in kind, but many members made monetary contributions towards the costs. To all contributors, go our warmest thanks.

Banquet and Ball. The 70th Anniversary Banquet and Ball was held on Sunday, 30th October, at the Empire Rooms, and proved an undoubted success both socially and financially. The wonderful result of £1,040 was due to the efforts of the Joint Chairmen Mr. F. J. Gertler and Mr. R. L. Curtis, and all the members of their hardworking committee.

At the final meeting, following the function, Mr. H. Turner agreed to be Chairman for the next Annual Ball, to be held on 26th November, 1961.

Jews' Temporary Shelter. To date £51 has been received from our members towards the special appeal.

J.P.A. Including the Kol Nidrei Appeal, £1,725 was raised by Hammersmith for the 1960 campaign. This year's activities were inaugurated with an appeal supper which provided an initial sum of £1,500.

Marriages and Barmitzvahs. Eleven marriages were solemnised, and eighteen boys celebrated their becoming Barmitzvah.

The actual presentation will take place on Thursday evening, 27th April and any member will be welcome.

The members of the Guild once again helped most successfully with the selling of flags on Geranium Day for the Blind, and the result was most gratifying.

Donations were made to many Institutions as well as local cases.

The weekly attendances through the year have not been good and are not very encouraging to the few members who attend regularly. There is still great need for the support of many more members of the Synagogue for this old Congregational Institution.

The Guild meet every Tuesday at 2.30 p.m. in the Communal Hall, except on the first Tuesday of the month when the meetings take place in the evening at 8.15 p.m. and all ladies will be heartily welcomed.

#### WESTERN AREA REGIONAL CLASSES

The second year of continuity of our centralised classes at Hammersmith has been characterised by a consolidation of all available educational forces in order to raise the standards of Hebrew and religious knowledge. We possess an earnest panel of teachers who, under the guidance of the joint Superintendents, Rev. S. Venitt and Rev. I. Abrams, are instilling into our pupils a fervent attachment to the tenets of our faith. In order to bridge the gap between young and old, it is essential for more parents to avail themselves of the exceptional facilities which are offered in our community in the field of adult Jewish education.

We are most grateful to Rev. S. Forscher for his excellent supervision of the tutorial Barmitzvah class. Boys are instructed in the art of reading from the "Sefer Torah" and reciting the "Haftorah" with a full vocal understanding of the "Neginoth" and an appreciation of the translation and Biblical background.

It would prove of inestimable benefit if more parents encouraged their children to attend the special Children's Services which are conducted so beautifully every Sabbath by Mrs. Venitt, in order to gain a valuable insight into synagogue procedure and acquire a love of the time honoured melodies.

The Western Area Education Committee decided to celebrate the historical landmark of the Centenary of the foundation in Great Britain of the Jewish Association for the diffusion of Religious Knowledge, by holding an Open Day on Sunday, 18th December, 1960. Several parents availed themselves of the opportunity of discussing with the Hebrew teachers, the religious problems and the educational advancement of their children. On the same afternoon, the traditional Chanukah service was held in the Synagogue. Six pupils of the classes, Jeremy Evnine, Harvey Shapiro, Stanley Tannen, Stephen Benjamin, Maurice De Vries and Laurence Coen, who undertook the salient sections of the service, sang exceedingly well.

We are following the pattern of last year's Prize Distribution which was held most successfully within the Synagogue. Our guest of honour on Sunday, 14th May, 1961, will be Rabbi Dr. I. Epstein, the distinguished Principal of Jew's College. As an outstanding educationist and one possessed of profound scholarship, his views will be anticipated with heightened interest. He has had several links with the Hammersmith Synagogue. His last memorable visit here was to inaugurate our Communal Library on 24th May, 1959.

#### WESTERN AREA CLASSES PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

The Classes are a combined effort, so the Parents' Association must be a combined effort too. The four synagogues, Hammersmith and W. Kensington Synagogue, Shepherds Bush, Fulham & District Synagogue, Putney & Wimbledon United Synagogue, Wimbledon & Putney Federation Synagogue, donate money directly to run the P.A. and the Committee members, who come from all four communities, are left free to do the actual work.

However, there is one small fund-raising function each year, a play by the Brook Drama Club. Last year, their kind efforts gave us a very pleasant evening's entertainment and raised £35 net towards our summer outing. (They are putting on another play for us this year, on Sunday, 30th April: please come along!).

The summer outing is the high spot of our year. On a lovely sunny day in June, 1960, we went to Chessington Zoo. The children had time to roam around and play in the fun-fair and, after lunch, they visited the circus. Then we went on to Staines Synagogue for tea. Our thanks are due to the Staines community for letting us have the use of their hall: it is a blessing to be able to have a sit-down meal in quiet, indoor surroundings.

The summer outing is the high spot, but the afternoon teas are our most important activity. We have given teas throughout the year to the children who come from school direct to the afternoon classes. Mrs. Venitt sometimes has to supervise, but we know we are imposing on her kindness when this happens. We are pleased to be able to say that this was not necessary for most of the year; Mrs. W. Kraus came along regularly twice a week, a really magnificent effort.

The P.A. provided tea at the annual prize-giving.

The Chanukah service was a combined affair this year. The children, trained by Rev. S. Forscher, gave an excellent service, and afterwards the P.A. gave them tea and provided a professional entertainer. They also gave tea to the adults.

The P.A. also suggested the innovation, which took place on the Sunday morning before Pesach, where the children conducted a model Seder. We must compliment Rev. I. Abrams and Rev. S. Venitt for turning a casual idea into a successful reality. The P.A. provided tea for a most enthusiastic audience of parents.

Unfortunately, our Chairman, Mr. M. Weintroub, who had done so much to weld together a combined P.A., was compelled to vacate the post for personal reasons. The new Chairman is Mr. M. Godel, a volunteer teacher at the classes, and we hope to go from strength to strength during the next year under his leadership.

Sir Barnett and Lady Janner were guests of honour of the Branch at the Annual Dinner and Ball, held at the Clarendon Restaurant on the 18th March last, Sir Barnett (a Vice-President of A.J.E.X.) delighted the large attendance with a delightful and witty speech punctuated with amusing Yiddish references, and praised the work of the Branch for its public work in Hammersmith which had enhanced the reputation of the Community with the Civic authorities.



#### LECTURES - PAST AND FUTURE (1960-61)

The autumn course (1960) given by Rabbi Dr. L. Jacobs on "Jewish Religious Thought" proved one of the greatest cultural attractions since the inauguration of these series nine years ago. The unique relationship of the Jewish people within the Divine order of worldly and other-worldly activities, has always intrigued the thinking congregant. Rabbi Dr. L. Jacobs presented a balanced picture, theological and philosophical, of the many problems of faith and belief. He contrasted the Jewish viewpoint with that of other faiths. A large weekly attendance proved an incentive to fruitful discussion, with clarification of many complex issues.

A strong panel of spiritual and lay leaders of the Anglo Jewish community has been assembled for our traditional inter-festival series of addresses, between "Pesach and Shevuoth." The theme of "Judaism in Our Day" is topical and challenging. Dayan M. Swift, ever a doughty champion of the authority of that great Court, will speak frankly on the contemporary activities of the Jewish community. Dr. Bernard Homa, author of "A Fortress in Anglo-Jewry" and an acknowledged expert on the medical aspects of Jewish life, will discuss some significant problems in this sphere. Rabbi M. Fisher, who is an eloquent speaker, and has returned recently from Eretz Yisroel, will discuss the advent of Israel as a spiritual force in our own day. This atomic age presents perplexing problems for the Jew as well as for men of all faiths. Professor Cyril Domb, protagonist of staunch orthodoxy and man of science, will harmonize these two imponderables. We are glad to welcome as a guest lecturer, Rev. Dr. Chaim Pearl, who has recently donned the mantle of spiritual leader of our neighbouring congregation, the New West End Synagogue. He will discuss the practice and the influence of Judaism in the contemporary world.



#### THE WESSIX CLUB

The conclusion of Saturday evening meetings at Brook Green is a good opportunity for retrospect. The winter of 1960-61 has been a most successful one as far as expansion and progress is concerned for the Wessix Club.

At our A.G.M. held at Brook Green on the 4th February, 1961, the resignation was received of the Co-Chairmen Maureen Green and Jack Grossman, they are undertaking a management course with the Association of Jewish Youth with the aim of returning to the Club as managers.

The membership now stands at the satisfactorily high figure of 73, our average Saturday attendance is in the region of 80-90, while at our dances we can normally rely on an attendance of about 120-130 people.

The activities held on Saturday nights have been largely of a social nature, and this was climaxed by the club's most ambitious project in the social field so far, the production and presentation of a 90 minute review, with the title "Lutkas and Gutkas." This was produced solely by the club members and committee and its presentation was enthusiastically greeted by the members. This same review was later staged for the Rendezvous Social Club (for over 35s) at the Ealing Synagogue Hall, where the show was also enjoyed even though the fuses succeeded in blowing three times during the evening.

As from the 25th March, 1961, the club will be meeting on Thursdays at Brook Green. We are also trying to obtain permission to meet at Brook Green on Tuesday evenings. The increased scope which this extra evening will provide will be utilised in broadening the activities of the club. A desire has been felt that if the club is to expand and grow healthy it must cater not only for the social needs of its members, but also to some extent to their cultural and physical needs. To further this end we intend to hold on Tuesday nights (if we obtain permission) discussion and drama groups, table-tennis coaching, and we also hope to obtain through the L.C.C., Judo equipment and instructors. In this way we hope to instruct girls in the art of self-defence, which we all feel is so important in these days; the classes will also be open to boys.

The club also hopes to enter a team in the A.J.Y. cross-country race at Parliament Hill Fields on the 23rd April.

We would ask all parents who have children between the ages of 13-17 to let them escape from the television for one or two nights in the week to attend the Wessix Club. We are certain that they will enjoy themselves, for it is not for nothing that the Wessix Club is known as the Friendly Club.

## HAMMERSMITH AND DISTRICT BRANCH OF THE NORWOOD CHARITABLE TRUST LTD.

The past year has been another period of steady advancement both for Norwood itself, and for the Hammersmith and West Kensington Branch.

At the Norwood Home and Orphanage it has at last been decided to do away entirely with the "institution" atmosphere, and to this end the old main building is to be demolished, and all the children are to be accommodated in small groups, each in its own house, and under the care of a housemother and housefather, in conditions as near as possible to those of actual families. The acquiring or building and equipping of these homes will naturally need a vast sum of money, and the Norwood Charitable Trust looks to its local branches for increased aid in the next few critical years.

In this worthy cause the Hammersmith Branch is proud to be able to record that its yearly contribution has increased steadily over the past five years. The recent Annual Dinner and Ball, held at the Empire Rooms on 5th February, was a great social and financial success, and resulted in the sum of £1,675 being raised.

During the year the Branch was most happy to recognise the great work done on their behalf by Rev. Venitt, and the occasion of his Bar Mitzvah year with the Hammersmith congregation was taken to name a bed at Norwood in his honour. The consecration ceremony was attended by a large gathering, who afterwards had the opportunity to see over the Norwood Home, and to hear at first hand the plans for the future.

The present Committee would welcome most heartily any addition to their ranks, and the Secretary would be pleased to supply any further details to any congregant who would care to give help, either by becoming an Annual Subscriber, or by serving on the Committee.

Any Jewish child who is deprived, through whatever circumstances, of a home of its own, becomes the responsibility of the whole community, and by supporting Norwood we can ensure that these children will have the love and care they need, and will not be lost to Jewry in the years to come.

#### WEST LONDON YOUNG ZIONIST SOCIETY

The West London Y.Z.S. is now celebrating its first birthday and not only has it filled the need for a predominantly cultural youth group in the area, but it has made an impression on the older societies of the Federation of Zionist Youth.

Meetings, which are held every Monday evening in members'

homes alternately in the Richmond and Hammersmith areas, have included "The Jew in Afro-Asia," "The B.B.C. Hebrew Section," "The Jewish Board of Deputies" and "The Work of a Probation Officer." We are now running two successful series, one inaugurated by the Rev. S. Venitt is on "Comparative Religions" and the other is entitled "Let the People Talk" in which members themselves participate.

The highlight of our social activities was the "Barbe-Kew" Dance, held in aid of the Ronnie Moont Memorial Fund. Horas were danced, sausages sizzled and friends were made.

A feature of our Coffee Bar Social at the "Champs Elysées" was the singing of Israeli and Spanish songs by Helen Laurence, who held her large audience spellbound. Two Film Shows have also been given.
